- The Board of Management recognises that child protection and welfare considerations permeate all aspects of school life and must be reflected in all of the school's policies, procedures, practices and activities. In its policies, procedures, practices and activities, the school will adhere to the following principles of best practice in child protection and welfare:

The school will:

- recognise that the protection and welfare of children is of paramount importance, regardless of all other considerations;
- fully comply with its statutory obligations under the Children First Act 2015 and other relevant legislation relating to the protection and welfare of children;
- fully co-operate with the relevant statutory authorities in relation to child protection and welfare matters;
- adopt safe practices to minimise the possibility of harm or accidents happening to children and protect workers from the necessity to take unnecessary risks that may leave themselves open to accusations of abuse or neglect;
- · develop a practice of openness with parents and encourage parental involvement in the education of their children; and
- fully respect confidentiality requirements in dealing with child protection matters.

The school will also adhere to the above principles in relation to any adult pupil with a special vulnerability.

 - In relation to any member of staff who is the subject of any investigation (howsoever described) in respect of any act, omission or circumstance in respect of a child attending the school, the school adheres to the relevant procedures set out in Chapter 7 of the Child Protection Procedures for Primary and Post Primary Schools (revised 2023) and to the relevant agreed disciplinary procedures for school staff which are published on the gov.ie website.
 - In relation to the selection or recruitment of staff and their suitability to work with children, the school adheres to the statutory vetting requirements of the National Vetting Bureau (Children and Vulnerable Persons) Acts 2012 to 2016 and to the wider duty of care guidance set out in relevant Garda vetting and recruitment circulars published by the Department of Education and available on the gov.ie website.
 - In relation to the provision of information and, where necessary, instruction and training, to staff in respect of the identification of the occurrence of harm (as defined in the 2015 Act) the school-
 - > Has provided each member of staff with a copy of the school's Child Safeguarding Statement
 - Ensures all new staff are provided with a copy of the school's Child Safeguarding Statement
 - > Encourages staff to avail of relevant training
 - > Encourages Board of Management members to avail of relevant training
 - > The Board of Management maintains records of all staff and Board member training
 - In relation to reporting of child protection concerns to Tusla, all school personnel are required to adhere to the procedures set out in the *Child Protection Procedures for Primary and Post Primary Schools (revised 2023)*, including in the case of registered teachers, those in relation to mandated reporting under the Children First Act 2015.
 - All registered teachers employed by the school are mandated persons under the Children First Act 2015.
 - In accordance with the Children First Act 2015 and the Addendum to Children First (2019), the Board has carried out an assessment of any potential for harm to a child while attending the school or participating in school activities. A written assessment setting out the areas of risk identified and the school's procedures for managing those risks is included with the Child Safeguarding Statement.
 - The various procedures referred to in this Statement can be accessed via the school's website, the gov.ie website or will be made available on request by the school.

- Risk of harm occurring due to inadequate supervision either in school or out of school activities
- Risk of child being harmed in one-to-one situations
- Risk of harm due to inappropriate use of online remote teaching and learning communication platform such as an uninvited person accessing the lesson link
- Risk of harm due to children inappropriately accessing/using computers, social media, phones and other devices while at school

- Risk of harm caused by member of school community communicating with pupils in an inappropriate manner via social media, texting, digital device or other manner
- Risk of harm caused by member of school community accessing/circulating inappropriate material via social media, texting, digital device or other manner
- Risk of harm occurring due to inappropriate relationships/communications between younger and older children mixing
- Risk of harm during Intimate Care situations
- Risk of harm due to racism
- Risk of harm due to one's prejudices- e.g. towards minorities, social backgrounds
- Risk of harm due to inadequate vetting of external coaches, volunteers or school visitors
- Risk of harm due to bullying of a child due by another child or adult
- Risk of harm due to exposure to inappropriate content or exposure to cyberbullying while on the internet on either school or personal devices
- Risk of harm caused by member of school personnel communicating with children in an inappropriate manner via social media, texting, digital device, in person or in any other manner
- Risk of harm due to incorrect application of school polices e.g. Code of Behaviour, Anti-Bullying Policy, AUP Risk of harm due to poor Data Protection/ Confidentiality

- The school implements in full the Stay Safe Programme

- Confidential Records are kept of all incidents or concerns
- The school has in place an Anti-Bullying Policy which fully adheres to the requirements of the Departments Anti-Bullying Procedures for Primary and Post Primary Schools
- The school has in place a Code of Behaviour for pupils
- The school undertakes anti-racism awareness initiatives
- The school has in place a policy for Intimate Care, Administration of Medications, Administration of First Aid and a plans in place in respect of children who require such care.
- The school has a yard/playground supervision policy to ensure appropriate supervision of children during breaks and in respect of specific areas such as toilets, back of school etc.
- The school has a Health and Safety Policy
- The school adheres to the requirements of Garda Vetting Legislation and relevant DES circulars in relation to recruitment, volunteers and Garda Vetting
- The school implements the Teaching Council Code of Professional Conduct for Teachers

- The school has an Acceptable Use Policy in place, to include provision for online teaching and learning remotely, and has communicated this policy to parents
- The school has a complaints procedure in place
- Has provided each member of school staff with a copy of the school's Child Safeguarding Statement
- Ensures all new staff, substitute teachers and volunteers are provided with a copy of the school's Child Safeguarding Statement
- Encourages staff to avail of relevant CPD
- Encourages Board of Management members to avail of relevant training
- Maintains records of all staff and board member training
- The school has in place a Critical Incident Management Plan, Health and Safety policy, Special Educational Needs policy

Important Note: It should be noted that risk in the context of this risk assessment is the risk of "harm" as defined in the Children First Act 2015 and not general health and safety risk. The definition of harm is set out in Chapter 4 of the Child Protection Procedures for Primary and Post Primary Schools (revised 2023)

In undertaking this risk assessment, the board of management has endeavoured to identify as far as possible the risks of harm that are relevant to this school and to ensure that adequate procedures are in place to manage all risks identified. While it is not possible to foresee and remove all risk of harm, the school has in place the procedures listed in this risk assessment to manage and reduce risk to the greatest possible extent.
